Hopes and Fears

You might remember in the last edition of the Villager there appeared a short article explaining the slightly mysterious looking white-shrouded structure in St Andrew's Churchyard. The new hedge surrounding the Garden of Remembrance has been hardening up over the last few months - and so far the deer are staying away!

The installation of this hedge was a wonderful example of what can be done when the church and wider community work together. As a church we were very grateful to our local benefactor, as well as all those who spent a precious Saturday morning digging, planting and fleecing.

We are very fortunate in our parish to have grounds at St Andrew's SSJ, All Saints' Monk Sherborne and Pamber Priory where anyone who lives in the parish can be laid to rest when they die, and where loved ones can visit.

While the churchyard that immediately surrounds St Andrew's is maintained by the local council (as it is closed), the Garden of Remembrance, SSJ Cemetery and the Churchyards at All Saints' and Pamber Priory come under the responsibility of the Parochial Church Council.

This responsibility includes grass-cutting (currently out-sourced to a contractor), tree, shrub and hedge maintenance, and keeping the overall space tidy so that families can easily visit

and care for their own plots. A Working Party of volunteers is organised several times of year to help with this and a number from the church community undertake work in between.

The PCC would very much welcome offers of help from anyone in the wider community who would like to get involved in helping look after these valuable parish assets. Our next Working Party will be early in the Spring, we hope to confirm and share the date soon.

We would also welcome anyone who might be interested in helping us to develop accurate maps of the churchyards. We receive regular enquiries from visitors wishing to locate past relatives and at present there is a very limited regularised plan of burial locations. How much better it would be if a full survey was able to be completed with the findings put online.

In any school, the spring term is a busy but focussed one. The excitement, the glitter, the different events, the craziness of Christmas are all over for another year, and January brings a fresh new start. For us at Sherborne St John Primary School, that means getting busy learning! When I invited the 'Stars of the Term' from the Autumn term from each class to a special headteacher's tea party back in the first week of January, the children filled me in on their hot new topics, so let me share it with you all too.

Class 1 (YR/1) and Class 2 (Y1/2) are both loving the same topic – A Royal Invitation, all about Kings and Queens, including learning about our new King. One child very excitedly explained to me at the start of term that the King has kindly invited them all to visit his castle in Windsor – what a wonderful trip, that I know the children are all looking forward to! I was asked if I wanted to be called 'His Majesty' by one child... I declined for now, but you never know!

Class 3 have been thoroughly enjoying their topic on London, called 'Visits, Visions and Visitors'. Their trip is just as exciting – a trip to London! The children have learnt about different landmarks in London, looked at maps and also thought about the history of the land-use of London and how the Thames was used for trade. A trip to London to drive past major sites including Buckingham Palace, Horse Guards Parade, Downing Street and the Houses of Parliament on the coach, as well as a chance to visit the Tower of London, will cement their enjoyment of learning about our capital city. Finally, Class 4 have loved their topic on 'Rainforests' - although I think they were a little sad that their teachers aren't going to take them on a plane to visit a real rainforest! However, they have enjoyed learning about what a rainforest is, what is found within them, where they are in the world and how the animals, plants and trees are all part of the complex biodiversity of a rainforest, as well as considering the effects of deforestation and thinking about those that make their homes in the rainforest. How fascinating!

Of course, our topic work is not all that has happened in the last month or so at Sherborne St John Primary School. Year R went on a Winter Walk to see the changes brought on by the weather, we've taken part in Tag Rugby and Sports Hall Athletics competitions, our Y5 children have been having squash lessons in Basingstoke, and Years 5 and 6 have been to QMC for Science activities. Phew! We will be ready to enjoy a break over February half term – and then get busy learning all over again.

Sherborne St John Parish Council

By the time you read this Christmas and the New Year will be a distant memory, however your parish councillors all hope you had a happy and healthy time, if you were working during the festive period that you and yours managed to enjoy most of it.

We have been told that the pathway on the A340 near Armstrong's is unwalkable. We will report this to the relevant folk, if you notice any other paths which cannot be used due to overgrowth please let the clerk know. Meanwhile we have the services of a Footpath Warden from BDBC which we are paying for so if you know of any issues with the official footpaths please let the clerk know and she will forward it on. The Lengthsmen continue to be active around the village - if you have a suggested task please let the Clerk or Jane know.

The Parish Council has also been told there has been another accident with a vehicle turning right at one of the two quite dangerous right turns into the Village. From the Basingstoke direction these junctions are at Elm Bottom into Elm Road and at Dixon corner into Cranes Road. If you see/hear of an accident at either of these junctions please encourage the parties concerned to report it to the police so any recorded evidence can be used to substantiate our endeavour with Hampshire Highways to implement road layout improvement.

Our financial situation is healthy although like everyone else our costs are also increasing. We are assessing the projects for the next financial year. We will need to replace the heating in the Pavilion as the current system is obsolescent and the lighting in the car park also needs improvement. By the



time this magazine arrives we will have completed the refurbishment works in the Pavilion where we have replaced the showers, toilets and the external drain to bring it up to modern standards.

You may be aware that we had some "illegal visitors" again on the 19th December. This time the Parish Council, rather than the very protracted time getting a court injunction, decided to contact a bailiff recommended by Mortimer PC. The Bailiff served notice on them within 48 hours and they left during the early hours of the 21st December.

We have been approached to join a scheme in conjunction with a solar farm application. The Parish Council will organise a separate public meeting in the coming months so you can hear their point of view and express yours. You may have heard that the government is threatening devolution and unitary authorities; we will have to wait and see how this may affect us all along with


Basingstoke and Deane. Hampshire CC is willing to discuss it apparently. Hopefully there will be plenty of opportunities for us to voice our opinion via consultation.

Please use the Village Shop when you can - use it or lose it....

Driving around the village and the immediate area the roads continue to be in a very poor condition with potholes having not been repaired properly. With the recent very cold weather they have either increased in number or got worse. Please continue to report them to BDBC.

*A reminder that the Parish Council no longer meets every month but bi-monthly at the Chute. We have put processes in place to make decisions that cannot wait in the intervening period so there will be no delays. You will find the dates of the meetings advertised on the notice boards around the village and our website.

Women's Fellowship

The year got off to a good start with a talk from Women's Fellowship member Lynne Kerr, titled 'Men I Have Married' - Lynne pointed out that these were strictly in her capacity as a Deputy Superintendent Registrar.

Having pursued a number of careers over the years, she found herself happily, to begin with, enjoying a life of relative domestic leisure in her converted barn in Norfolk, but became bored at home so set about seeking employment.

He is still married to my cousin. It turned out that the groom was a serial philanderer and had proposed to another on the morning of this wedding. Needless to say, the ceremony did not continue, and did not materialise.

Another ceremony which Lynne remembers fondly was a couple, both American, based at the American Airbase local to Kings Lynn - the groom was called very suddenly to go to Afghanistan. 



Re-creating a Water Meadow

'Water, water everywhere' complained the Ancient Mariner in Coleridge's 'Rime of the Ancient Mariner'.

Well, there has certainly been a lot of water recently. Sherborne (which means something like 'bright water' in Anglo Saxon) has been awash. Days of rain have left our fields flooded and our streams in spate.

Not that this rain would have overly worried our ancestors who made use of the abundant water of Sherborne St. John to create a system of water meadows. Looking at local topography and also 19th-century Ordinance Survey maps we can see how fields were flooded for early spring growth (water raises the temperature of surrounding land giving perfect conditions for grass).

The maps below show evidence for water meadows in the valley north of Manor Farm House along the Wey Brook (running towards the millpond).

So what is a 'water meadow'? Well, it involved intervention – in a so-called 'simple' water meadow a head drain takes water off the main stream upstream, taking it along and above the main stream. From the head drain 'hatches' are cut that let the water flow back to the main stream across the meadow, thus making a water meadow.

What was good for grass was good for cattle and sheep, who must have enjoyed fresh spring grass after months of winter hay in barns. The 18th-century shed opposite Manor Farm House is a rare example of sheep shed. One can imagine lambs gambling down the hill to graze on bright spring grass in the fields

(Long-standing villagers might remember that until as late as the 1980s, there existed to the north of Manor Farm a ditch that took water from the fishpond (the village pond) alongside

the old piggeries to flood the field adjacent to the sheep shed, so this part of Manor Farm was also likely to have once been given over to sheep.)

Recently, we have been working to restore a part of the old water meadows, not for lambs, but to increase the floral biodiversity of the rewilded Manor Farm fields. So-called 'fenland' plants cannot live without flood water – return the water and back will come these rare plants.

The photo below shows that our efforts have been rewarded in ways that might alarm even an Ancient Mariner!



News from the Hospital

How fortunate we are locally to have a hospital where productivity is continuing to improve. This contrasts with the public sector as a whole, where productivity is still 8.5% below pre-pandemic levels. It is also worth mentioning that not all hospital trusts are achieving improvements.

It is sad that this government's latest re-set for the NHS, with its list of 'new' improvements (for example, bringing care into the community, and use of more digital), is portrayed as being a totally new initiative. In fact, this has been the plan for a long time, as those who studied the documents relating to the plans for the new hospital based on these changes will also be aware, so nothing new here!

That we need a new hospital is beyond doubt, especially as maintenance costs for the present Basingstoke facility are rising very rapidly, pushing the Trust's budget well into deficit this year. It is so serious that a lot of equipment well beyond its normal service date is having to be retained until its terminal failure.

The Hampshire Together New Hospital Programme, together with patients and representatives of the community, has been studying the feedback from the planned new hospital public consultation which ended in March, and in its light adapting the proposals for the business case, which must be approved by the local Integrated Care Board (ICB). This work is now close to the stage for the final document to be submitted for the ICB to review and approve. Sadly, any new hospital locally will be delayed behind the work being undertaken in those hospitals built with 'aerated concrete' (RAAC) which of course represents a safety hazard. Hospitals affected by RAAC are at the top of the Secretary of State's list of priorities to ensure patients can receive care in buildings that are safe and fit for purpose.

Ambulance queuing remains an issue, with several factors not helping, these include winter viruses; the lack and delays in the installation of home equipment for patients leaving hospital (it is recognised home is often the best place for recovery); lack of joined up care; the cost of care homes – many now with weekly costs approaching £2,000. Perhaps it is also relevant to mention that we are the nation in Europe with significantly the lowest number of hospital beds per head of the population!

On a positive note, a new Urgent Treatment Centre (UTC) has now opened at Basingstoke- the UTC is separate to the ongoing work of the New Hospital Programme. Service from these facilities is designed to treat people requiring urgent - but not life-threatening care more efficiently, protecting emergency department services for patients presenting with the most severe conditions. These facilities are being developed to alleviate pressure across our Emergency Departments. People can access the Basingstoke UTC via 111 or will be directed from the Emergency Department.

However, the GP problem, where surgeries are private businesses, has not been helped by the recent changes to their costs in the budget. Similarly, just throwing money at the NHS, "doing the same thing over and over again and expecting to get a different result" is in Einstein's words the definition of madness. As any wise management consultant would advise, find the problems, devise solutions and then one knows where to target investment if it is really required.

Again, on a positive note, with the growing world uncertainties, our Trust has wisely done a lot of work recently to improve cyber security, so hopefully we will not incur a situation as experienced by some trusts following the recent hack of a widely used testing lab, which caused so much disruption to patient flow.



2025 marks the 80th anniversary of the end of World War 2. Following the D Day landings in June the previous year, British and Allied troops slowly forced the German army into a retreat and many tough battles took place and lives lost. The German forces and people were wearied by continuous heavy bombing raids on their cities. On the night of 13/14 February 1945, the city of Dresden was razed to the ground by two enormous waves of British and American heavy bombers. It was a hard attack to justify, as 'Bomber' Harris, AOC Bomber Command later discovered but it brought fear and demoralisation among the population.

On 7 March 1945 our forces crossed the Rhine and continued to fight their way to Berlin where the total surrender of the Nazi regime was received on 7 May and Victory in Europe VE Day declared the following day.

It is not clear, as these notes are compiled, how this momentous event will be commemorated nationally or locally but be assured the RBL will play its part.

The darker side of the end of the war was the dawning of the full realisation of the dehumanising horror of the Nazi concentration and death camps as they were liberated. Ten years ago, on the 70th anniversary of the end of WW2, as Leicestershire & Rutland RBL County Chaplain I was tasked to lead a service of remembrance in the de Montfort Hall. Amongst the hymns and prayers, I invited the leader of the Leicester Synagogue to read Psalm 13 in Hebrew, the language of Jewish worship. It was

one of the most poignant moments I have ever experienced.

Our Branch will be supporting our parishes Summer Fetes again this year. Also on Saturday 7 June we have a few tickets for the final rehearsal, the Colonels' Review, of this year's King's Birthday Parade, Trooping the Colour, on Horse Guards Parade. Probus Hears About the Dambusters



Many will have seen the 1955 film, "The Dambusters" and speaker Rhydian Vaughan MBE explained that scenes involving the bouncing



bomb were subject to the Official Secrets Act and what was shown was not like the shape of the real thing. The creation of designer Barnes Wallis, code named 'Upkeep' was in fact drum shaped, weighing more than four tons. It was engineered to spin backwards at 500 RPM so that when it hit the dam wall its reverse spinning would ensure it would hug the wall as it descended the depths.

Dam Busters raid Two spotlights were used to gauge altitude Modified Lancasters dropped backgound from bornes which skipped over topedo ones protecting the dam. After impact the Bomb soun down to the dam's base and exploded

The three dams of the industrial heartland of the Ruhr valley. the Mohne, Eder and Sorpe had been identified in 1937 as potential targets, but it took until May 1943 for 'Operation Chastise' to come to fruition.

The scheme had several detractors, mainly from head of RAF Bomber Command, Arthur 'Bomber' Harris but was overruled by the then head of the RAF, Sir Charles Portal (of our local Portal's family bank note paper manufacturer}. Nineteen of the newly introduced AVRO Lancaster bombers, each costing £42,000 and needing

a crew of seven, would have to be modified to carry the experimental weapon that had originally been thought was to be used against the German battleship, Tirpitz.



Wing Commander Guy Gibson, DSO & Bar, DFC & Bar, a twentyfour-year-old bomber flying ace, known unaffectionately as 'The Boy Emperor' due to his unfortunate manner in dealing with subordinates, was asked to form Squadron X, soon to be renamed 617 Sqn to perform one specific task. He had only eight weeks to form and train a new squadron to carry out the raid on the dams. By the 16/17 May the dams would be at full capacity. It was known that it took one hundred and fifty tons of water to make 1 ton of steel.

Barnes Wallis had calculated that his rotating mine would need to be dropped at a specific speed, height and distance from the dam for several




bounces to reach the wall and at night, facing defending fire from the dam wall.



Eight Lancasters, along with 53 airmen, did not return to RAF Scampton. Guy Gibson was awarded the Victoria Cross – his response to this was subdued as he felt responsible for those he had recruited and who had not returned.

While the raid on the dams was a great morale booster, within a few months they had been repaired as there was no follow up missions to prevent them being rebuilt. However, the labour needed was brought in from building the Atlantic Wall, the German construction across the northern French coastline, and it was



subsequently recognised that had this delay not occurred the D-Day landings would have not succeeded.

Man sentenced for 'disgusting' fly-tip

A man who fly-tipped enough waste to block a road in a rural area of Basingstoke and Deane has been given a suspended prison sentence plus rehabilitation activity days and unpaid work.

Mark Henry Bates of Mansell Close, Windsor, appeared at Basingstoke Magistrates' Court for sentencing on Friday 10 January, having pleaded guilty to the fly-tipping offence at an earlier hearing held in September last year.

During this hearing, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, who brought the prosecution, told the court that Mr Bates had been employed by a Kempshott resident to remove and dispose of waste following a renovation project.

The waste was later found dumped four miles away, in Well Close, Wootton St Lawrence, on Sunday 26 February 2023. The waste blocked Well Close and prevented a resident from leaving their property.

Sentencing Mr Bates to eight months imprisonment, suspended for 12 months, 10 rehabilitation activity days and 80 hours of unpaid work, the district judge described the offence as "disgusting behaviour". He also ordered Mr. Bates to pay clean-up costs of £634 and a contribution to the costs of the prosecution of £600.

Cabinet Member for Housing and Residents' Services Cllr Laura James said: "Fly-tipping of this nature is inexcusable. We are prepared to take tough action on fly-tipping where it is appropriate and this sentence proves the courts support this approach.

"This fly-tip blocked an entire access road. This not only prevented residents from getting to and from their homes but also could have prevented access for the emergency services, which could have had devasting consequences.

"It is extremely costly to clear fly-tipping

but the cost is not just financial, it impacts our environment, our wildlife and our communities."

Cllr James added: "This case highlights why it is so important for people who are arranging for waste to be removed from their property need to check the waste removal company is licensed and can provide the correct paperwork."
