For hundreds of years, the villagers of Sherborne St. John have enjoyed views across the medieval fishpond (first recorded 1302) to the fields and woods beyond.

Without an annual check, the main fishpond would have grown over with trees (as its sister pond has to the wooded side of Church Path).

# All Change

As the summer draws to a close and the leaves begin to turn, the beginning of another new season reminds us that change is both inevitable and natural. Many of our young people will be putting on a new school uniform, some of us may be starting a new job, or perhaps some of you have just moved home and this is your very first time reading the Villager magazine – welcome!

Change is natural and is often good, but change can be challenging too. It often means saying goodbye to something or someone we hold dear or have depended on for stability and security. New can be exciting but the unknown can leave us feeling uncertain or even afraid.

Which is why we also need things in our lives that don't change. A "Rock" if you like. In our community we find reassurance and comfort in unchanging places like Sherborne St John school which celebrates its 175th anniversary this month. Or our churches – Pamber Priory will soon be celebrating its 900th birthday! In our personal lives many of us can speak of a loved one who has been our "Rock" when everything else around us has been unsteady and changing.

The hymnwriter Thomas Chisolm captures this thought beautifully:

*Great is thy faithfulness, O God, my Father;* There is no shadow of turning with thee. Thou changest not, thy compassions, they fail not; As thou hast been, thou forever wilt be.

Whatever changes lie ahead for you in this new season, God's promise that he and his love for us will never change, is one we are all invited to discover for ourselves by looking to Jesus Christ -the fulfilment of all God's promises, and the same "yesterday, today and forever" (Hebrews 13v8).

# The Gridley Challenge – 20th Anniversary

As Sherborne St John School celebrates its 175th anniversary of providing a high quality education and start for children in Sherborne St John and the Basingstoke area, there is also another anniversary this year. The Gridley Challenge celebrates its 20th anniversary this year (it's actually been going for 21 years, but missed a year through COVID).

My wife, Sally and I, had three children who were given a thoroughly splendid education and grounding at the school; for which we and they are very grateful. All are in their 30s now and in successful careers as a Doctor, Chartered Accountant and Civil Engineer.

Sally was the chair of the Parent Teachers Association for a number of years when our children attended the school. At this time, she recognised that there was a period of time for the final years, when the syllabus was essentially complete, the SATs taken and the school play preparation underway, where a non-syllabus team activity could be potentially accommodated. She recommended this to the head at the time and The Gridley Challenge was born.

The Gridley Challenge is a team activity, normally comprising 3 to 5 students, where a different project task is set every year. This requires research, assessing and analysing options, selecting a preferred solution and then

developing the material, report and final presentation. Most importantly it requires focus on the task, good teamwork and effective allocation of the work roles. At its culmination, the teams prepare a presentation of their project journey and outcomes. All children stand up to present the material to Sally and myself and other judges; after which a winner is selected, prizes awarded and feedback given to all teams. It seems that the students really enjoy this challenge.

Over the years we have seen many interesting projects, but one that sticks in the mind was a traffic calming / management scheme, whereby a ski-type chair lift was installed in Sherborne St John to transport people around the village. What fun that would be.

It has been a real pleasure for Sally and I to see the students' excellent work and effort and the great outcomes of this Challenge. The ability to be focused on a task, work well in a team and be confident enough to stand up and present are key skills for work and life in general.

Hopefully there will be further Gridley Challenges and future anniversaries to celebrate. We are happy to support this initiative for as long as the school wishes.



The Easter holiday break in of the woodworking shed at Mencap's Green Fingers extensive site at the Elizabeth Road allotments in South Ham was well publicised when thieves got away with £5,000 worth of wood working tools and equipment.

Tim Knight, CEO of Green Fingers, explained, "Inflation has pushed equipment replacement costs above the insured value, but generous public donations of equipment and funds have provided strong support".

The 105 years old Elvetham Masonic Lodge, that operates out of the Basingstoke Masonic Centre in Victoria Street at the Top of Town, has donated £500 to Green Fingers as part of its annual giving to local charities and good causes.

Making the presentation to Noelia Rico Cordera, the full-time manager of Green Fingers, Peter Foster, the lodge's charity steward said, "The interest earned on the lodge's investments allows Elvetham Lodge to financially support local needy causes. Overall, in Hampshire freemasons donate around £1 million each year and across the UK it reaches £50 million."

Green Fingers, supports 40 adults each week with learning disabilities through horticultural and woodworking activities, has long relied on community goodwill.

The woodworking activities include the manufacture of bird tables, stools, troughs and garden ornaments are

sold producing an income of around £4,000 each year.

The Green Fingers site is part of Mencap's overall activities around Basingstoke that includes gardening in the community, one to one support and some leisure services.

Tim Knight says that with these activities Mencap reaches around 500 people each week but is concerned this is a small percentage of an estimated 4,000 people in Basingstoke many of whom could benefit from their support services.

# Royal British Legion



Another significant event commemorated this month is the Battle of Britain, fought in the skies over the Chanel and southern England between July and September 1940..

After the miraculous evacuation of the Dunkirk beaches in June of that year, Germany needed to win air superiority over the Royal Air Force and the Naval Air Service prior to a planned marine invasion of our islands.

This was the first ever major aerial combat and despite being massively outnumbered, our pilots and ground crews gained the upper hand. Pilots who flew the legendary Spitfires and Hawker Hurricanes were not just from Britain but also from many Commonwealth countries, under the inspired leadership of Air Marshall Sir Hugh Dowding of Fighter Command. September 15 is regarded as the day when the tide of battle turned in our favour and the second Sunday of September is now observed as Battle of Britain Sunday. This year's civic BDBC service is at St Mary's Church Tadley at 11am

Residents in Basingstoke and Deane and Hart will be able to recycle more and reduce how much they waste when new weekly food waste collections to be introduced during the week beginning Monday 6 October.

Food items including fruit and vegetable peelings, meat and fish and bones and shells, tea bags, eggshells, pet food and all uneaten food and plate scrapings will be recycled and turned into greener energy and fertiliser.

When the new service starts, residents will put out their food waste caddies each week on the same day their rubbish and recycling containers are collected, unless they are contacted separately to tell them otherwise.

#### All households will be provided with:

- one grey indoor caddy
- a roll of liners
- and an information leaflet to help them use the service.

#### Containers for outside the home:

- residents who have wheeled bins collected from the kerbside will also receive a green outdoor caddy
- those people with communal waste bins will be delivered a large, shared food waste bin separately.

"Food waste recycling is a great opportunity for people to see just how much food they might be wasting. Cutting down on avoidable waste like out-of-date food or uneaten leftovers, could help to save people money while also reducing their impact on the environment."

"We understand that people may have questions. The handy guide delivered with your caddies should answer most queries, but please also check our website or contact us if there is anything else you need to know about your new weekly service."

for sending the venom of the poisonous snakes to laboratories working on vaccines for snake bites. This required some skill in getting the snake into a dustbin, with a small









Vaccinations Autumn approaches and it is time to start considering the vaccination programme once again. Eligibility ages change and you need to be aware of the new guidelines. You may no longer be eligible for the one you had last year and other ages are lowering. Whatever the changes, rest assured the surgery will contact you to book the appropriate vaccination booster.

#### The Dispensary

Having a dispensary in a semi-rural location is a valuable resource, especially for our older patients, those without transport and for those with young children. It also means that if you require urgent medication such as antibiotics following a consultation you don't have to face a drive and wait at the pharmacy in Tadley or Chineham. Please support the surgery by using the dispensary. They have access to your prior medication and can refer back to a doctor if needed. To coin an overused expression – "use it or lose it"

#### **Repeat Prescription Reminder**

To ensure smooth and timely access to your medication, please follow these important steps:

#### 1. Order Early

Don't wait until you're nearly out. Submit your request well in advance to avoid running out and needing emergency supplies.

#### 2. Using the NHS App (Mobile or PC)

- Select the medication you need by ticking the boxes
- Click Continue
- Review your selection carefully
- Press Confirm and Send
  You can check the approval date under
  Requested Medicine.

Incomplete requests will not be authorised or dispensed.

#### 3. Avoid Delays

Many delays happen because requests are not completed correctly. This can lead to emergency supply requests, which take priority and delay routine prescriptions for others.

**4. Wait for a Text Before Collecting**Please do not come to collect your medication until you receive a text confirming it's ready.
